






THE UNUSUAL DOG Being Open to Differences

Once upon a time several dogs lived together in a meadow. Each dog was a different color. One was black, one was white, and one was brown.










"Look at the blotches on your coat!" the brown dog shouted. "Do you want us to catch those blotches?"

Then they all started barking. The poor spotted dog was forced to leave.










"Why did you come? I mean, why aren't you scared of me?" he asked.

When he replied, "Why would I be scared?" the spotted dog explained the awful situation he was in.







"I saw a dog like you once in a village," said the sheepdog. "But even if I had not seen that dog, what is there to be scared about? Not all dogs' fur is the same."

Then he said,










there was nothing to be scared of, that lots of animals are different from each other.

Title	Lesson plan for Erasmus+ project		
Topic	First Step to Literature: Fairytales – Shadow games		
Class / Duration	40 minutes		
Materials	1 white curtain/clothe, 1 flashlight, hacivat-karagöz templates to color and cut(1 for each student), gluestick, 2 pencils for each student, tape		
Methods and approaches	Total Physical Response, Induction, Communicative Approach		
Homework	Communication practice buy using puppets		

Step 1

Teacher introduces students the characters and their history. Teacher shows his/her own puppet to set an example.

Step 2

Teacher hands out a template of 2 puppets which is 1 template for every 2 students. Students cut the paper in half everyone gets their own piece. In every pair, 1 student colors and cuts Karagöz and the other colors and cuts Hacivat.

Step 3

After the pairs finish coloring and cutting process, teacher assists each student to make their own puppets. Once the puppets are all ready, teacher sets the stage where the action takes place.

Step 4

2 teachers go behind the curtain, and by using their puppets, they play a little introduction game. One teacher puppets the Hacivat and the other puppets the Karagöz and this way they ask each other introduction questions. After the example is done, 1 teacher and 1 student do the activity together. Once all the students get a hang of how to make the puppets work and how to use the target language, teacher steps back and pairs of students start to make the shadow games by themselves.

Outcome

Austrian students learn about Turkish culture and by making good use of it, they acquire the target language. It is also a cross-curricular activity linking culture and target language, which is simply a win-win situation.
